

Chapter 34 Medication Safety

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When a client experiences an allergic response to a medication, the medication acts as an antigen, triggering the release of the body's antibodies. The client may experience itching, urticaria, a rash, or in more severe cases, have difficulty breathing. The client's response to morphine is not an example of an allergic effect.
