Indigenous Knowledge for Biodiversity Conservation

Areas managed by indigenous peoples are the oldest form of biodiversity conservation, and often the most effective. The global coverage of Indigenous Community Conserved Areas has been estimated at about 13 percent of the terrestrial surface of the planet, including 400-800 million hectares of forest.
